BIG LOTTERY FUND (BIG)

Awards for All Sports Projects

Due to less funding being available, sports clubs can only seek a maximum of £15,000 in total from Awards for All. This means that if you have had a grant of £10,000 last year, the most you can apply for now is £5,000. If you have free reserves in excess of the total cost of your project you are less likely to get funded. Therefore it is important that if reserves are being set aside for a particular project, this is made clear in your accounts. New clubs (i.e. those without a track record or 12 months audited accounts) may only be able to apply for a maximum of £5,000. You are unlikely to get funding for like for like replacement of old equipment, but can apply for new equipment to improve sporting provision.

Awards for All Land and Building Projects

The maximum project size you can apply to Awards for All for is £75,000 including VAT. Awards for All can fund up to £10,000 of this but the majority of other funding should be in place before you apply.

Small Grants Evaluation Summary

The Big Lottery Fund (BIG) recently commissioned the Policy Studies Institute to complete a large-scale study which explored the purpose, benefit and potential of small grants from the perspective of both funders and projects. The following Small Grants Programmes that are currently being delivered across the UK were included in the evaluation:

- Awards for All - England
- Awards for All - Wales
- Awards for All - Northern Ireland
- Awards for All - Scotland
- Investing in Ideas - Scotland
- Active Lifestyles (small grants) - Northern Ireland
- People's Millions - UK
- Reaching Communities - England
- Breathing Places - England
- International Small Grants - UK
- Make it Happen (Young People's Fund) - Wales
- Big Deal (small grants) - Northern Ireland
- The Big Boost - England

Key findings from the evaluation:

- A wide range of features in small grants programmes are important for applicants. These include the size of grant, the detail required for the application form, the focus of a programme and the speed of funding decisions.
- Small grants funding was perceived by some grant holders as a stepping-stone to develop the skills and experience necessary to apply for further grants. 58 per cent of BIG projects surveyed through the evaluation were first-time applicants.



Nithsdale Council of Voluntary Service

- Applying for small grants was particularly challenging for organisations that did not have any previous experience of funding.
- 70 per cent of survey respondents found the monitoring process useful as it led to improvements within their projects and helped them to develop better management systems.
- 71 per cent of the grant holders surveyed agreed that their project had been very successful in their local community, 60 per cent felt that individual lives had improved, 62 per cent offered more activities and 51 per cent had reached new beneficiaries.
- Despite the relatively small sums involved, small grants were cited as leading to a range of benefits: improvements in local facilities, an increase in community interaction and improvements in community cohesion, health and wellbeing.
- Small grants have helped organisations to improve the skills of staff and volunteers, increase their chances of sustainability, raise their profile in the local community and develop new partnerships, and they have provided them with the opportunity to deliver more innovative solutions to local problems.
- Suggestions for improving small grants programmes include simplifying the application process, providing more support for organisations inexperienced at applying and managing grants, making quicker decisions about funding, providing better feedback about unsuccessful applications, awarding longer term funding and funding staff costs.

NEW FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

ARTS

Arts Sponsorship Award

This scheme has had an additional £50,000 of funding, from the Scottish Government, for the remainder of the 2009/10 financial year. Administered by Arts and Business Scotland, it aims to:

- increase the number of businesses sponsoring the arts in Scotland;
- encourage cultural organisations to approach businesses which have not sponsored the arts before, or have not sponsored for at least three years; and
- encourage non-Scottish based companies to sponsor arts activities in Scotland.

Applications are therefore welcomed to this £1 for £1 match funding scheme, which supports any first-time sponsorship from private businesses backing the arts in Scotland.

With the overall aim of increasing the number of businesses sponsoring the arts in Scotland, the scheme effectively doubles any funding from new sponsors at a minimum of £1,000, up to a maximum of £40,000. Sponsorship can be cash and/or in-kind support and can be used for arts activity or capital expenditure.

Application may be made by the business or arts applicant and, the business need not be based in Scotland. However, it must be sponsoring the arts in Scotland for the first time or must not have sponsored the arts in Scotland since 1 April 2006.

Networking Artists' Network - Go and See

This scheme provides small grant awards of up to £500 to allow artists groups to visit each other within the UK and beyond. Bursaries are available to support travel between artists groups and networks in the UK or overseas so that the artists can benefit from critical feedback, research and personal/group development.

Applications are invited from artists groups and networks only, meaning at least two artists working together with at least 10% of the artists in the group being subscribers to the Networking Artists Network.

Guidance notes and applications are available from their website. Applications must be emailed before each of the closing dates; however you are encouraged not to leave it until the last minute.

The 2010 deadline for applications is 1 March, 1 June, 1 September and 1 December.

Old Possum's Practical Trust

This scheme makes a number of grants each year, usually within the range of £500 - £5,000, to further the aims of the Trust, which are 'to increase knowledge and appreciation of any matters of historic, artistic, architectural, aesthetic, literary, musical or theatrical interest'. Grants are more likely to be given for projects that involve:

- children or young people
- disabled or disadvantaged people
- communities and which fall within historic, artistic, architectural, aesthetic, literary, musical or theatrical criteria, and which enhance the lives of others rather than the wellbeing of the applicants themselves.

Scottish Arts Council's Flexible Funding

This scheme is investing £7.98m each year in a Flexible Funding programme (2011-2013) in order to achieve the following:

- A body of creative work of high quality
- Most, but not necessarily all, of which is presented or produced in Scotland
- The work should be celebrated at home and beyond
- The activity supported should result in a good geographic spread within Scotland.

The aim of this fund is to support activity that is likely to have a high impact. The fund has been established to enable:

- an organisation to be directly involved in creating/supporting the production and/or public presentation of the work of artists and creative practitioners
- an organisation to offer a range of services, support and advice to other arts and creative organisations, enabling these to best deliver and develop their programming and business objectives

Grants will range from £50,000 - £500,000 however 25% must be sought from sources other than the SAC, with 10% minimum in cash for grants up to £99k, rising to 25% in cash for amounts over £350k.

Legacy Trust UK's Community Celebrations Programme

War Memorials Trust

This scheme provides grants to repair, conserve and preserve war memorials in their existing form as well as helping to reinstate the memorial to its original design.

Currently two schemes operate in Scotland:

- Freestanding memorials are eligible for support from the specific Small Grants Scheme in Scotland. The scheme can also be supported by Historic Scotland. Grants for up to £7,500 and up to 75% of eligible costs. Applications are invited all year round.
- Non-freestanding memorials could be supported by the main Small Grants Scheme that operates across the UK.

The Self Management Fund

This scheme has been established by the Long Term Conditions Alliance Scotland (LTCAS) and funded by the Scottish Government.

LTCAS is an independent Scottish charity, funded by the Scottish Government until 2011. The charity aims to bring together voluntary and community organisations across Scotland to give a national voice to ensure the interests and needs of people living with long-term conditions are addressed. Their vision is for "a Scotland where people with long-term conditions enjoy, not endure, full and positive lives, free from discrimination and supported by access to high-quality services, information and support".

The fund will strengthen new ideas, developments and existing approaches in self management. To make sure this happens, and to provide a structure for allocating the funds, the Self Management Fund has the following core criteria:

- To fund projects that will build the capacity of people with long-term conditions to effectively self manage.
- To fund projects that encourage new approaches to self management.
- To fund projects that enable people with long-term conditions to take a leadership role in delivering and promoting self management.
- To fund projects that work together with public services to support the principles of the Self Management Strategy.

MISCELLANEOUS

The Skinners' Company Lady Neville Charity

This scheme provides grants that will make a clear and significant contribution to grassroots charitable organisations working in designated priority areas.

One-off grants of £500 - £1,000 are made to small registered charities and not-for-profit organisations employing less than the equivalent of four full-time paid staff, which are working in the following priority areas:

- Disability Projects that provide opportunities to people of any age with physical or mental disabilities;
- Local Heritage projects that help local groups to conserve and restore their landmarks, landscape, traditions and culture;
- Local Community Projects that are involved in improving the facilities or quality of life for people in a deprived neighbourhood; and
- Performing and Visual Arts Groups involved in undertaking a particular activity in any field in this area.

They fund items of non-recurring expenditure (e.g. equipment, an event, a particular element of capital building works). Grants should make a clear and significant contribution to the project. OLDER PEOPLE

AFTAID

This scheme considers applications for a wide variety of grant requests as there are many reasons why an older person may find themselves financially stretched beyond their means to the point of genuine distress.

Whilst applications from individuals, or their family and neighbours are eligible applicants are requested to include with their application some written support from care professionals (Doctor, Social Worker etc.) or similar professional of the official care services who are personally aware of the beneficiary's situation.

However most often the fund is contacted directly by members of the caring professions and voluntary organisations.

The beneficiary of the grant **MUST** be:

- of state pensionable age (60 years old for women and 65 for men)
- a UK citizen, residing in the UK
- on a lower income and have minimal savings

Once all the pertinent information has been gathered and verified, a decision is made as quickly as possible.

The Kids' Fund

This scheme is committed to raising awareness about the natural world. The Council works through a network of 17 residential and day Centres in the UK providing courses for schools and colleges at all levels in addition to adult Individuals & Families courses, outreach education, training and consultancy. The Kids Fund aims to bring environmental understanding to disadvantaged young people by attending a course at a Field Studies Council centre. It helps disadvantaged young people to attend a course who may otherwise be excluded due to some form of disadvantage - health, mobility, deprivation or financial. The following are eligible to apply:

- Disadvantaged young people aged 8-18 years.
- Voluntary youth groups (either run by voluntary leaders, managed by a voluntary organisation, a registered charity).
- A school group may apply if they are aiming to provide benefits which are additional to the statutory school curriculum or clearly show added value, depth and breadth to the taught curriculum.

Funding will normally be up to 80% of the cost of your group's course to an FSC Field Centre to a maximum of £3000.

Young Carers

This scheme, contracted by Comic Relief to the Princess Royal Trust for Carers, will deliver a three year, £1.5 million grant programme aimed at supporting young carers in the UK. Applications are accepted from any third sector or not-for-profit organisation that wishes to help young carers with a maximum grant of £72,000 available over three years from July 2010.

The programme will target funding at the following:

- The most isolated and vulnerable young carers.
- Young carers from potentially excluded communities (including those from black and minority ethnic communities, newly arrived to the UK, refugee community members or young carers who may be socially excluded due to stigma attached to the cared for person).
- Young carers experiencing a significant negative impact (emotional and/or physical) as a direct result of their caring role.

TRUSTS

Fidelio Charitable Trust

This scheme aims to help individuals and groups of exceptional ability who would not be able to carry out an artistic project or activity without financial support, particularly those who are at an early stage in their careers.

Grants of up to £5,000 are available in support of the Arts, in particular the dramatic and operatic arts, music, speech and dance.

Grants may be awarded to enable individuals or groups of exceptional ability to:

- receive special tuition or coaching, e.g.: in the case of musicians, to attend Master Classes;
- participate in external competitions;
- be supported for a specially arranged performance; or
- receive support for a special publication, musical composition or work of art.

Applications are accepted on behalf of individuals and groups who are practitioners or performers in the Arts as well as institutions and colleges providing opportunities for those studying, practicing or performing.

However proposed grantees must be recommended by an appropriate person in an institution, college, arts festival or similar organisation that can vouch for the abilities of the applicant.

There is no upper age or nationality restriction and the work for which money is sought may be overseas but the proposed recipient(s) must be based in the UK.

Application forms are available from the Trust's website and should be accompanied by a one page A4 letter. They can be submitted by e-mail or post and applicants should include an e-mail address for reply.

VAF - Community Chest (Scotland)

The aim of the Community Chest is to help build the capacity of small community groups in Scotland to deliver their activities. The programme is designed to help small community groups in Scotland sustain and develop their activities by providing grants and free training.

Groups can apply for funding for a wide range of activities or operational costs. However, VAF is particularly keen to fund activities that will help build and develop strong organisations, for example:

- training for committee members and volunteers;
- visits to other organisations or conferences; and/or
- professional support or consultancy.

The programme has £400,000 available over the two years 2009-10 and 2010-11 with grants of up to £1,000 available.

Free training will be offered to all groups applying for a grant on topics such as charity law, making successful funding applications, and monitoring and evaluation. The training events will also provide information on where groups can go for further support and funding. Groups receiving a grant will be expected, as a condition of the grant, to attend at least one of the free training events.

Applications for the Community Chest programme are welcome throughout the year with deadlines on the 31 March, 30 June, 30 September and 31 December 2010.

Waterways Trust - Small Grants Scheme

This scheme contributes to achieving the vision of the UK waterway network being revitalised, valued, supported and enjoyed by all sections of the community.

Clore Leadership Programme

This scheme is offering approximately 20 Fellowships for the 2010/11 Programme with the aim of training and developing a new generation of leaders for the cultural sector in the UK.

Fellowships are offered over a wide range of cultural activity, including the arts, visual arts, community arts, museums and galleries, heritage and libraries. Applications are welcomed from any individual involved in, or seeking to become involved in, the cultural sector in the UK. Applicants should normally have had a total of at least five years' work experience, either in employment, self-employment or freelance and be living in the EU.

Fellows undertake an individually tailored programme of activities. This programme usually lasts for a year and includes the following:

- A programme of professional development, including two residential leadership courses, intensive workshops and other learning opportunities.
- Mentoring and coaching.
- A three-month placement in an organisation very different from the Fellow's usual working environment.
- Working with a small group of Fellows on a special project, culminating in a half-day presentation.
- The production of an original article about an aspect of leadership which the Fellow has researched and which will be published to stimulate debate about leadership.
- The option of submitting a proposal for a three-month research project, supervised by a Higher Education Institute based in the UK, which the Fellow would undertake after finishing the core Fellowship programme.

Fellows can choose to take a period of six months away from work and receive a bursary of up to £15,000 while doing their programme, or continue to be attached to their place of work, with their employer being compensated for any sustained periods away.
